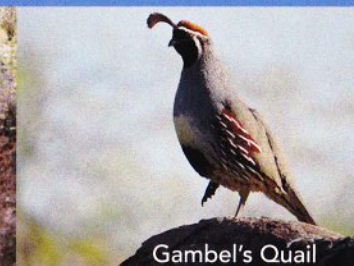
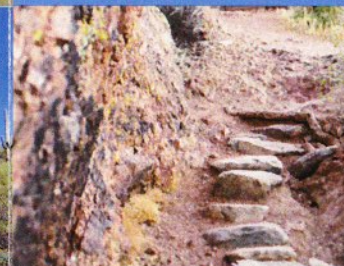
FREE GUIDED HIKES

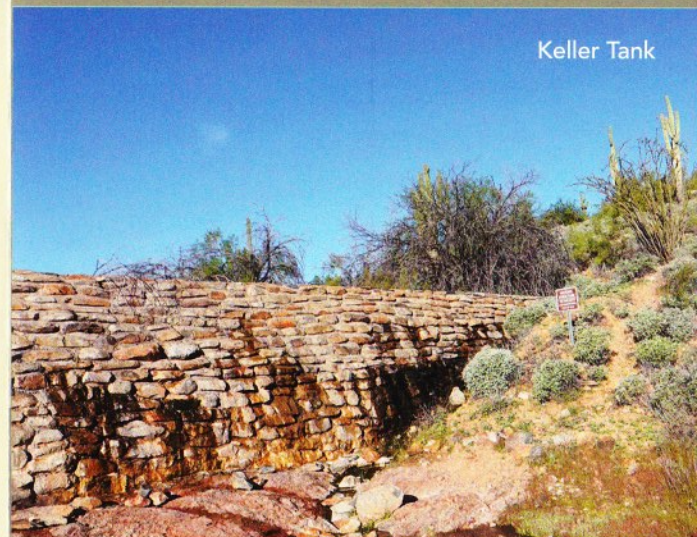

Gambel's Quail

- One mile of trails on gentle slopes ranging from 1,696 to 1,800 feet
 - Interpretive signs identifying more than 30 native plants
 - Educational signage highlighting geology, desert ecology, and local history
- Historic features, including the abandoned P-Bar Ranch site
- Keller Tank, a 1941 livestock dam built by ranch hands
